Hopefully when all is resolved we may be able to return to our 'happy place', ie., monthly rallies with our many friends.



# Michael Burdette's Art Class ...

<u>A Little about Dayboro</u> .... Dayboro is a town and locality in the Moreton Bay Region and is situated approximately 46 kilometres north-northwest of Brisbane. To the north of Dayboro lies the D'Aguilar Range and the mountain township of Mount Mee. Other towns include Samford and Petrie. Dayboro has a recorded population of 1,692.

Dayboro was first known as Hamilton, having been so named after a farmer, Hugh Hamilton, who was appointed Receiving Officer for mail in 1875. In 1892, it became known as Terrors Creek from the creek on which it is situated. In 1917, however, as the Postmaster General declared that Terrors Creek sounded too



much like Torrens Creek, once again, the township acquired a new name. In 1917 the name was changed to Dayboro after William Henry Day who leased the town land for a sugar plantation in 1867.

Timber, maize, vegetables and dairy products provided the main income for the settlers. The failure of Day's sugar growing experiment within a few years brought about the gradual breaking-up of his large land holdings and facilitated the further development of the area. A store and hotel, the nucleus of the town, were established in the early 1890s and these were followed by a sawmill around 1900 and the Silverwood Butter Factory in 1903.

In 1915, in an article urging the extension of the railway from Enoggera to Terror's Creek, the township was

described as 'being set prettily on a hillside, and being the centre of miles of agricultural, dairying and fruit lands'.

On 25 September 1920, a railway line to Dayboro was opened, running through Samford from Ferny Grove. There were a number of stations servicing the line, including at Kobble Creek, Samsonvale, and Samford. The line serviced Dayboro and surrounding areas for 35 years, continuing to operate until 1 July 1955 when it closed due to declining traffic, largely from the increased access to the area by road traffic.

The Dayboro line is also famous for Queensland's worst rail disaster, which occurred on the morning of 5 May 1947 near Camp Mountain when a crowded picnic train derailed on a sharp left-hand curve between Ferny Grove and Camp Mountain stations. Of the 215 passengers on the train, 16 were killed and 38 injured.

Remnants of the Dayboro railway line can still be found throughout Dayboro and surrounding districts, including former railway bridges over the North Pine River, and cuttings along Strong Road. Railway pits were once located between the local swimming pool and sawmill (now the Old Mill Animal Hospital).

Mini Drags (Dayboro) .... The ever-popular QCC Mini Drags will feature at the Dayboro rally on Saturday night with practice at 3:00pm (Saturday). Members are requested to bring any racing paraphernalia that they have which can be used to decorate the hall and to instill a racing atmosphere to the event. Also, members are

encouraged to dress in their best racing gear and prizes will be presented to individuals for their best racing attire. And don't forget to bring your best and super-fast hot wheels car. Lance has offered to bring his DeLorean along as a feature to the event.



> hat do you know about crude oil? .... Crude oil is also referred to as petroleum, which means 'liquid rock'. Crude oil can be refined to produce a number of different products. In an oil refinery, crude oil is first heated and the resulting vapours are transferred to a 'fractionating tower' that breaks-down the crude into parts or fractions. The lightest vapour rise to the top of the tower while the heavier ones stay near the bottom. When the lightest vapours are condensed, motor spirit (petrol) is produced. Medium-weight vapours are condensed to form kerosene, diesel and heating oil. The heaviest are condensed to produce lubricating oil. The sludge remaining in

the bottom of the tower is used to make asphalt.


In addition to petrol, the vapours at the top of the fractionating tower are also used to produce petrochemicals. Chemists have used these petrochemicals to create thousands of products which we use every day. Products such as clothing, toothpaste, fertilizers, bandages, food additives, lipstick, shampoo, compact disks, vitamin capsules, candles and sunglasses to name just a few.

I will bring a bottle of crude to the Dayboro rally. It is from the Jackson oil field, the largest onshore oil field in Australia and located approximately 160 kilometres (99 miles) west of Thargomindah in south-west Queensland. Lance.





## 'Bread Roll Holder'


Material Requirements:

- $\Rightarrow$  Any queries to Di Brearley on 0409 281 049.




