Next Rally ~ Oakey (Showground), 10-16 July. Arrive no earlier than 12 midday,

Wednesday 10th July and leave no later than 10:00am Tuesday 16th July.

Route 1 – From Brisbane. Follow the Ipswich Motorway and then the Warrego Highway (A2) to Toowoomba. Continue along the A2 for approximately 25km and turn right onto Toowoomba Road which continues into Campbell Street, Oakey. At the end of Campbell Street, veer left into Bridge Street and continue for approximately 350 metres after which turn right into Davidson Street crossing the railway line. After crossing the railway line, follow Davidson Street to the left. At approximately 300 metres, turn right onto the Oakey-Cooyar Road and follow for a short distance then turn left into Showgrounds Road. The entrance to the showgrounds is on the left.

Route 2 – From Brisbane North: Follow the D'Aguilar Highway to Yarraman, turning left onto the New England Highway. Follow for approximately 30km and turn right onto the Oakey-Cooyar Road and follow through to Oakey a distance of approximately 55km. The showground/racecourse will be on the right on entering Oakey. Turn right into Showgrounds Road. The entrance to the showgrounds is on the left.

A Little about Oakey Oakey is a rural town in the Darling Downs region and is situated 160 kilometres west of Brisbane and 29 kilometres north-west of Toowoomba. Oakey has one of those unintentionally funny town names. It was, reputedly named after the river oaks on the banks of Oakey Creek. Oakey is noted for two things: it was the home of Bernborough, one of Australia's most famous racehorses of the mid-1940s, and, just outside town, the Australian Army Flying Museum.

Prior to European settlement, the area around Jondaryan was occupied by members of the Barunggam aboriginal people. Oakey was first settled in the early 1840s when pastoralists moved into the area and claimed large areas of land for grazing. In 1859, the Jondaryan Woolshed was established in the area, and in 1867, the railway reached the district and a settlement grew-up around it.

The Oakey Post Office was opened in 1869, and in 1871, one daring entrepreneur opened a short-lived meatworks near the town. The plan was to tin and export kangaroo and wallaby meats under the dubious marketing name of 'Australian Game'. The enterprise was unsuccessful and closed down in 1876.

The town's moment of glory came with the birth of Bernborough at Rosalie Plains in 1939. For his first four years Bernborough was restricted to racing in the local area and became something of a legend on the tracks around Toowoomba. In 1945, Bernborough was sold to the well-known Sydney restauranteur, Azzalin Romano, who bought him for 2,600 guineas. Bernborough died in the USA in 1960.

During World War II, an air base was established to the north of the town. At its peak the base housed 2,000 airman. Today Oakey is a prosperous service centre.

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

QCC member, Patrick Hetherman, will be giving a PowerPoint presentation at the Oakey rally on Saturday afternoon commencing at 2:00pm. The presentation will highlight Patrick's experiences while working at the Cooby Creek Tracking Station which was involved in the moon landing of 21 June 1969. Cooby Creek, which was located 23 kilometres north of Toowoomba, provided a vital link by relaying communications between NASA and the moon mission. The station was built in 1966 to support NASA's Application Technology Satellite Program and was a part of the Spacecraft Tracking and Data Acquisition Network. It had approximately 100 electronic/electrical technical staff and 50 support (diesel mechanical and other) personnel; an



average 'space operation' involved approximately 100 staff. The station was self-powered by four jet turbines and most likely held the first computer in Queensland. The station ran on the American 115VAC system, not the Australian 240VAC system. A 12-metre (40-foot) parabolic antenna was used to receive and transmit information to geostationary satellites. The Cooby Creek Tracking Station closed in 1970.



From the Editor Quite a gap between the Dayboro rally and the Oakey rally which gave me a bit of breathing space this month.

Apologies for me not being around for much of the Dayboro rally as I had other commitments to attend to on Sunday and therefore I had to depart on Saturday.

Many thanks to Wendy who provided me with imagery from the Saturday night mini-drags. Remember that rally photographs may be found on the club's website as well as on Facebook. Lance.

What do you know about gold? What is 'true' or 'pure' gold? Pure gold is too soft to be used for jewellery so it is usually alloyed with copper, silver, nickel, platinum or some other metal to give it strength or durability. Adding these metals to gold can give the gold a rose, green or white hue.

Gold is measured in 'karat' weights. Some typical karats are:

24 karat = 100 percent gold.

18 karat = 75 percent gold.

14 karat = 58.5 percent gold.

10 karat -= 41.6 percent gold.

The higher the karat weight, the more valuable the jewellery. Generally, jewellery must be at least 10 karats to be classed as gold. According to law in some countries, all gold jewellery must be marked with the karat weight. This mark is usually on the inside of rings and on the clasps of necklaces or bracelets.

A word of warning. In Mexico, it is legal to call an item gold if it is at least eight karats.

Did you know

- It is easier to find gold that to win a state lottery.
- It is rarer to find a one-ounce gold nugget than a five-karat diamond.
- About three tonnes of ore must be mined and processed to produce a single ounce of gold.
- One cubic foot of pure gold weighs 1,000lbs (2,2046kg).
- Gold is extremely malleable and can be hammered or rolled into sheets so thin that a one-inch stack of sheets would require 200,000 sheets of gold. A single ounce of gold can be rolled into a sheet covering 100 square feet.
- Gold will not tarnish, corrode or rust. Gold-leaf church towers hundreds of years old still shine as if they were new. The mask of the Egyptian pharaoh, Tutankhamem, was still bright and shiny when found even though it was about 4,000 years old. (Did you know that King Tutankhamem was a 'mummy's boy'? Ha ha!
- If all of the gold in the entire world were compressed into a single cube, it could easily be placed under the Eiffel Tower. It would form a cube of about 20 yards on each side.





Craft Project for Oakey 'Non-Slip Sewing Machine Foot Pedal Pad'

Material Requirements:

- 2 x 11 inches x 6 inches of non-slip spongy material.
- ⇒ I x 9 inches x 5 inches of scrap fabric for roll front.
- ⇒ 1 x 40 inches x 3 inches material cut for binding ironed in half so ends-up 1 1/2 inches wide.





To make one 5 inch square you will need:

- ⇒ Black homespun. Enough fabric to make a 8 inch circle.
- Coloured fabric 5 inch square with 5 inches of iron-on pelion ironed on back.
- Needle for hand sewing (with large eye) and cotton (white crochet cotton to do decorative tacking).

A brief background on the Australian Army Flying Museum for those intending to visit it on Saturday (1:15pm). Museum is located on the eastern side of the Oakey Army Aviation Centre and has vast collection of aircraft and related memorabilia from all eras of Australian military flying. See innovations required to survive in the theater of war, and the advancements in aviation technology across time. The memorabilia room houses an array of smaller items of a more personal nature, carried and used soldiers and by Australia's airmen

throughout their service in numerous conflicts around the globe.

Restoration and maintenance of the exhibits is a credit to those people who volunteer their time to man the museum. Aircraft on display is covered from the early 1900's to today from fixed-wing to helicopters.

The Army Aviation Centre was originally constructed in 1943 by the Royal Australian Air Force and known as RAAF Base Oakey as a training facility for No 6 Aircraft Depot and overflow aircraft maintenance depot for RAAF Base Amberley. It was later to store surplus aircraft after the war.

On I July 1968, the Australian Army Aviation Corps was formed with the Department of Civil Aviation aerodrome at Oakey transferred to Army control on I July 1969. During the period up to the early 1990s, aircraft types operating from the base included Bell OH-58 Kiowa, Bell UH-1 Iroquois, Sikorsky S-70A-9 Blackhawk, Pilatus Porter, and GAF Nomad. Blackhawk, Tiger and Chinook helicopters conduct aerial operations from the Oakey Army Aviation Centre in recent times.
