



CARD KIT TOOLS NEEDED FOR CLASS:

- Pencil.
- Scissors.
- Metal ruler (metric preferred).
- Eraser.
- Scorer (Cheap Shop sells these).
- Double-sided tape, 6mm (Reject Shop sell this) \$2.00 or \$2.50 approximately.
- Metal craft knife with spare blades (Cheap Shop).
- Liquid glue.
- Foam squares 3D, acid-free (Cheap Shop sell these).
- Sticky tape with dispenser.
- A4 cutting mat or similar.

Calling for Interest in the Art of Bonsai

onsai is a fascinating art-form that combines horticultural techniques and Asian aesthetics in a unique way. The art originates in the Chinese empire and was copied and adapted by the Japanese to what we know now as Bonsai trees. Literally translated 'bon-sai' means 'planted in a container'.

To understand what Bonsai is, we need to learn more about its meaning and history. The Chinese started creating miniature landscapes over 2000 years ago. The further the reproduction was in size from the original, the more magically potent it was likely to be. A student could focus on its magical properties and gain access to them. During the Kamakura period (700 years ago) the Japanese copied the art-form and from that moment on, a distinctive Japanese style emerged. Instead of entire land-scapes, the Japanese started growing individual trees. These trees are what we know as Bonsai today.

Over the years many styles to classify Bonsai trees have been advanced, closely resembling circum-

stances in nature. These styles are open to personal interpretation and creativity, meaning that trees do not necessarily need to conform to any form.

Still, the styles are important to gain a basic understanding of shapes and should serve as guidelines to successfully train miniature trees.

These are all techniques that our multi-talented and indisputably renowned, Michael Burdette,

will pass on to any interested club members, however, those of you who know Michael, know that these will not be 'lectures' but real workshops where you will develop your own Bonsai – your own personal creation.

s caravan owners, you are probably familiar with the unnerving experience of encountering caravan sway. Caravan sway, commonly referred to as 'yaw' or 'fishtailing', can range from a brief and frightening experience through to a complete loss of vehicle control resulting in an





accident. Swerving, side winds and air pressure changes caused by passing trucks are causes of caravan sway. Fortunately, <u>electronic stability control systems</u> are available to be installed on your caravan to increase your towing safety and confidence. Two systems available are the 'Dexter Sway Control (DSC)' and the 'AL-KO Electronic Stability Control (ALKO-ESC)'. Both work to detect and control the side-to-side movement of a caravan in relation to the tow vehicle.

In an emergency, both DSC and AL-KO ESC will engage to control sway and save you from a potential accident, however there are a few key differences in the systems and the way they operate. DSC applies the left and right brakes separately similar to anti-locking braking (ABS) in a vehicle for quick sway correction. The sway control braking level is automatically varied, based on the severity of the sway. DSC is more sensitive to sway than the AL-KO ESC and will engage when smaller amounts of sway are detected. AL-KO ESC applies a measured amount of braking based on the preset weight of the van and applies brakes on all wheels after significant sway force is detected. DSC adjusts the braking for any caravan weight where AL-KO ESC is customized to each caravan with the unit programmed to the weight of the caravan specifically. This factor makes DSC more suitable when empty and loaded. Tow weights vary as with plant trailers and horse floats. DSC is powered from the caravan battery and avoids the requirement for the system to be wired to the vehicle which is the case for AL-KO ESC.

If you take your van off-road you may be more inclined towards DSC as it features automatic off-road detection where AL-KO ESC needs to be unplugged from the vehicle. For AL-KO ESC, a switch can be additionally installed in your vehicle to enable you to manually disengage/re-engage the system when off-road.





What is a 'Brake Controller' and how does it work?

id you know that brake controllers are vital components to a safe towing experience? Chances are, you are already aware that it takes more than just the tow vehicle's brakes to bring both the vehicle itself and its trailer to a full stop in a suitable time frame. If you take into account trailer weight and speed, it becomes clear that the trailer also needs to pitch-in with its own braking power. This is accomplished via the trailer's brakes, which can be one of two types: surge (mechanic or hydraulic), which rely on inertia to automatically slow down, or electric brakes, which require an electric connection to the tow vehicle to work. The principle behind surge (also known as override or overrun) brakes is simple. The coupling contains a sliding shaft attached to the tow ball; the shaft slides when pushed due to the vehicle slowing down and exerts pressure directly on a mechanical linkage (mechanical brakes) or on linkage connected to a hydraulic cylinder, which in turn creates hydraulic pressure on the braking system (hydraulic brakes). These are most often found on boat trailers. Electric trailer brakes, on the other hand, work by activating electromagnetic brake drums to create attrition and therefore slow the trailer down. While surge brakes operate independently, electric trailer brakes need to be connected to the power of the tow vehicle and be regulated by a brake control unit, or electric brake controller.

A <u>brake controller</u> is an electronic device that activates, and, as the word suggests, controls the electric brakes of a trailer. A brake controller can be roughly split in an interface, positioned in the cab within the driver's reach, and a main part, responsible for activating the brakes of the trailer. Electric brake controllers can essentially be classified in non-proportional, or time-based, and proportional, or inertia-based types. The older non-proportional electric brake controllers are activated when the driver presses on the car's brakes, applying braking force over time-based on the chosen setting. The drawback of this kind of brake controllers is that even though the pressure applied on the tow vehicle's brake pedal can vary (for instance, compare a gentle brake to an abrupt one), the response of the trailer brakes will be the same, the one configured in its settings. The newer proportional electric brake controllers on the other hand measure the changing momentum, or inertia, of the moving car via an accelerometer; they are not directly connected to the car's brakes and work independently of them. Continuously monitoring the vehicle's dynamics, these controllers send the precise amount of voltage to the trailer brakes to ensure that the speed of the trailer matches that of the tow vehicle. This generally makes for a smoother braking experience and more efficient braking, ensuring your trailer brakes last longer. For instance, when going downhill, you'll want to engage lower gears to slow down in order to decrease brake wear; inertia-based brake controllers sense that the vehicle is slowing down (rather than the vehicle's brakes being applied) and therefore adjust trailer braking power accordingly.
