Little about Kilcoy Kilcoy is a rural town on the D'Aguilar Highway in the Brisbane Valley, 70 km north-west of Brisbane. It is situated on Kilcoy Creek near its entry to the north end of the Somerset Dam. Formerly, the creek was a headwater of the Stanley River. Population is 1898 (as at the 2016 census).

In 1841, Evan and John Mackenzie took a pastoral lease between the Stanley and Brisbane Rivers. The leasehold, 35,000 acres, had an estimated capacity for 1200 cattle and 12,000 sheep with yearround pasture. The MacKenzies named the pastoral station Kilcoy after their father's Kilcoy estates on Black Isle, Scotland. The MacKenzies sold Kilcoy in 1849 and Kilcoy Homestead (c1857) was

built by Louis Hope which is now on the Queensland heritage register. Much of the pastoral station was subdivided for farm selections in the 1890s.

The town of Kilcoy, originally known as Hopetown (and Hopetoun from 1904 to about 1907), was established on the Kilcoy and Sheep Station Creeks in the 1890s. A school was opened in 1892, the Hopetown Hotel and the Church of England following later that decade. Another hotel, the Exchange, was built in 1901 and a Catholic church was opened in 1909.

The town's population was over 700, and at least that many again were in the district when an area was severed from Caboolture Shire and subsequently became Kilcoy Shire in 1912. The following year the Caboolture-to-Woodford branch railway line was extended to Kilcoy. The Caboolture-Woodford line was closed in 1972.

Attractions: Somerset Dam. Located 10km south of Kilcoy and named after local MP Henry Plantagenet Somerset, which was started in 1935. It was first used to supplement Brisbane's water supply in 1943 and it was completed with a 305 metre dam wall in 1959. The dam has 237km of shoreline, a catchment area of 340 square kilometres, an area of 8,100 hectares and a storage capacity of 904,000 megalitres. It extends 56km upstream from the dam wall. Today the dam supplies water to Brisbane, Logan, Ipswich, Redcliffe, the northern end of Gold Coast City, and the shires of Beaudesert, Esk and Kilcoy.

Why do I need an 'Electric Brake Controller'?

Now imagine what would happen if your trailer only had its own electric trailer brakes and did not have a brake controller system in place. Let's say you're ready to start your first camping trip with your shiny new caravan secured behind your vehicle. You drive down your driveway towards the road, brake to turn and BOOM! Your caravan may push the vehicle into a dangerous situation. Why? Because your trailer's electric brakes simply did not work. Electric trailer brakes do not activate on their own; they require a brake controller in order to do so.

It's easy to see why trailer brakes and brake controllers are a legal requirement around the world, and Australia is no exception. The relevant legislation in our country is provided by ADR38, which specify trailer brake requirements based on GTM (Gross Trailer Mass) and are legally binding in all states. Maximum GTM is supplied by the manufacturer and all trailers built since August 1989 are required to list the trailer's ATM, GTM and tare weight on their Vehicle Identification Plate (VIP). ADR identify three different trailer categories based on their GTM:

♦ GTM less than 750kg: brakes (hence brake controllers) are not regulated.

While the law does not explicitly state the necessity of having brakes installed on lighter trailers, and unless the trailer is way under 750kg GTM, it is still good practice to do so in order to aid your tow vehicle's brakes. To this end, you may choose to install either surge or electric brakes.

♦ GTM between 750kg and 2,000kg: brakes are required and must operate on both wheels of at least one axle.

We have two options here. Option one: the trailer can be equipped with mechanical or hydraulic override brakes, which do not require electricity to work and are therefore well-suited for boat trailers, which often end up in water. The drawback of this type of trailer brakes is that it is either 'on' or 'off', with no in-between possible. In this case, a brake controller is not required as they activate automatically.

Option two: equipping the trailer with electric brakes, which run on the electricity supplied by the vehicle. In this case, an electric brake controller is required. Moreover, the brake controller needs to be designed in such as way as to enable the trailer's braking force to be progressively increased and decreased, as opposed to implementing a stable braking force; this requirement entails that the brake controller must be of the proportional, or inertia-based type. Additionally, the brake control device must be controllable from the driver's seat. Proportional electric brake controllers enable more accurate and controlled braking and reduce wear of both towing vehicle and trailer brakes; while they apply the trailer brakes in proportion to the vehicle's slowing down, they are also adjustable by the driver.

♦ GTM over 2,000kg: brakes are required and must operate on all wheels/axles.

The law states that trailer brakes are mandatory and must be operational on all wheels; furthermore, they must be designed so that the braking force can be progressively increased and decreased and be adjustable from the driver's seat.

Whilst that is exciting for the sport and will provide, we Nomads, with something to look forward to it does raise some questions for us and me. More on that later.

Some of the arrangements are falling into place. First, each one of us will need a UHF radio, either in car or hand held or both. There is some talk that radios will be available but do not bank on it. We need them whilst travelling to and from the event anyway. As last year, a repeater will be put in place. Anyone who is unaware of duplex operation, we have a few happy hours between now and then to work it out; it is simple.

As expected, we will need to arrive in St George ready for Friday afternoon/evening activities. I think arrive Thursday takes pressure off set-up and allows a lay-in Friday morning prior to an eventful afternoon evening. Those who have been to St George will understand the following. The road alongside the weir, St Georges Terrace, between the weir and Roe Street will be closed. Access to off-road transports and trailers only. They will be anything from 4WD and trailer to a b-double! The race machines will be off-loaded and driven to scrutineering near Barlee Street. After scrutineering, they will be lined-up, herringbone, on St Georges Terrace adjacent to Rowden Park. They will be held there for public display until after the fireworks display which will take place on private land opposite side of the Balonne River.

Access to St Georges Terrace will only be via the southern end near the weir bridge and I assume road closures will occur on the side roads. It will be very active here. After the fireworks, it is intended to drive all the race vehicles from herringbone along Grey Street, turn right Into Victoria Street and convoy all the way down to the bridge whence a turn right into St Georges Terrace and re-load onto trucks and trailers. The convoy will be under police escort. That bit I have my doubts about but we will see. Undisciplined race drivers in unregistered vehicles down that wide road? Oh yeah. Anyway it will be a spectacle. More news soon, including where we will be staying.
