nother great rally; well-patronised considering many members were still in transit returning from the national rally in Albany WA.

Wednesday. Arrived early with rally marshals, Bob Kearney and Keith McCallum. Laidley In Brief Laidley lies within the Lockyer Valley and is 83 kilometres west of Brisbane. The local industry has been dominated by agriculture since the end of the 19th century and Laidley has long regarded itself as 'Queensland's Country Garden' with fruit and vegetable production featuring prominently; the majority of beetroot grown in Australia coming from the Laidley district. Allan Cunningham first explored the area in 1829 and named it 'Laidley's Plain' on 22 June 1829, after James Laidley, the Deputy Commissary General of the colony of New South Wales. The town developed around a wagon stop on the main road route between Ipswich and Toowoomba. (P7)

Are you lowing illegally? Towing laws differ across states, and there can be substantial fines if you break them. You might think that towing a caravan is a quiet, leisurely pastime that's not going to attract the attention of the law, yet there are plenty of rules and regulations that relate to towing that could bring you undone, some of which attracting hefty fines and demerit points.

Each state is different. The main safety standards for vehicles and vans are set by the Federal Government. Things like trailer standards, are set in a document called Vehicle Standards Bulletin 1 (VSB1), are then enforced by state and territory governments with their own laws. But each state interprets the standards differently.

It's the same with the Australian Road Rules. They have no legal effect, until enacted in each state and territory. While much effort has been made to standardise road rules, there remain some that are unique - including those involving towing.

Overweight issues. One of the main things that you need to get right is to not exceed your van's maximum allowed trailer weight (Aggregate Trailer Mass (ATM)), which you'll find on the van's compliance plate. The only way you'll know for sure you haven't exceeded this is to get your caravan weighed when it's all loaded-up ready to go on a trip. If you just guess the weight and get it wrong and it exceeds the ATM, you may cop a fine and loss of points. For example, in NSW, the fine is \$439 and a loss of three points for exceeding the plated ATM. In Victoria, on the other hand, there are several fines according to the level of over-loading, but the highest is for when the van's weight is between 15 and 20 per cent more than

the ATM. If caught, that'll cost you a whopping \$1682 (from July 1, 2018), but no loss of points. While you're unlikely to suddenly find the police doing random caravan weight testing as often they do random breath testing, overweight caravans are increasingly on the police and transport authority's radar, if a much-publicised spot check last year in Victoria is anything to go by.

(from Page 3) A stop was needed after the climb over the small Little Liverpool Range west of Marburg. By the 1850s, the area was being cleared for sheep grazing and a survey for the growing village was conducted in 1858.

Laidley Post Office opened on 1 February 1861 and the Laidley Rail Post Office opened in 1915 but closed in 1925. In the mid-1870s, the railway line from Grandchester stopped at a railway station 1.5 kilometres north of the town, and between 1911 and 1955, a branch railway line ran from Laidley along Laidley Creek to the settlement at Mulgowie.

The town was the centre of the Shire of Laidley until 2008, when the shire was amalgamated into the new Lockyer

Valley Region local government area. In the 2011 census, the township had a population of 3,518 people. The Laidley Library opened in 2017. Laidley Old Township Provisional School opened on 9 March 1908. On 1 January 1909, it became Laidley Central State School. The school closed on 12 December 1998 when it was replaced by the Laidley District State School at a new location.

St Mary's Catholic Primary School opened on 14 July 1912 by the Sisters of Mercy. The Sisters operated the school until 1988 when the first lay principal was appointed. Laidley State High School opened on 29 January 1985; this effectively replaced the secondary department that operated at Laidley North State School from 1864 to 1984.

S.S. Warrimoo - The ship that missed New Year's Eve but gained two centuries. A great story ...

The passenger steamer S.S. Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working-out a star fix and brought the master, Captain John Phillips, the result.

The Warrimoo's position was Lat 0° 31' N and Lon 179° 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899. "Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke-in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the equator and the international date line."

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called his navigators to the bridge to check and double-check the ship's position.

He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather and clear night worked in his favour.

At midnight the Warrimoo lay on the equator at exactly the point where it crossed the international date line! The consequences of this bizarre position were many: The forward part (bow) of the ship was in the southern hemisphere and the middle of summer. The rear (stern) was in the northern hemisphere and in the middle of winter.

The date in the aft part of the ship was 31st December 1899. Forward it was 1st January 1900. This ship was therefore not only in two different days, two different months, two different years, two different seasons but in two different centuries – all at the same time.

S.S. Warrimoo Stats:

- Launched: 5 May 1892.
- In service: July 1892.
- Out of service: May 17, 1918.
- Speed: 14.5 kts (26.9 km/h; 16.7 mph).

The fourth surgeon interjects, "You know I like construction workers because those guys always understand when you have a few parts left over at the end, and never complain when the job takes longer than you said it would."

But the fifth surgeon shut them all up when he observed, "You're all wrong. Politicians are the easiest to operate on. There's no guts, no heart, no balls, no brains, and no spine, and there are only two moving parts - the mouth and the anus - and these are totally interchangeable."




Camp Site Information from Patrick ~ the lad from Kobble Creek!

Product description:

Suburban Recreational Vehicle Water Heaters fitted to Australian made caravans and motorhomes.

Model SW6DEA, SW6DA, SW4DEA, SW4DECA, SW6DECA and SW6PA. Manufactured from 04 April 2018 to 01 August 2019.

17,931 affected vehicles.

What are the defects?

During use on gas, hot water services with the defect may emit carbon monoxide into the caravan or motor home cabin.

What are the hazards?

If the unit is powered by gas and is operated in an enclosed area – such as caravan or motorhome - carbon monoxide may spill into the vehicle and poisoning could occur resulting in serious illness, injury or death.

What should consumers do?

Consumers should immediately check if their appliance is affected, and if so, cease using the appliance powered by gas. (Consumers may continue to use the appliance if powered by electricity only.)

Consumers with affected appliances should contact Coast RV's dedicated recall hotline on 02 9645 7685 to register their details to be advised of remedial actions when they are available as the remedial process has not yet been finalised.

To identify affected appliances: open the exterior access door to the hot water service and check the model and serial number located on the right hand side.

Affected Model numbers are SW6DEA, SW6DA, SW4DEA, SW4DA, SW4DECA and SW6DECA with serial numbers between 181315552 and 193002648 (some serial numbers may end with a 'D'), 8183311827 and 8190201139.

Repaired units will be labelled. If you see a label next to the model/serial number that says CTC001 the inspection has already been completed and the appliance can continue to be used.

If the label is not present and the appliance falls under this recall you must discontinue use of the hot water service on gas and seek inspection and repair.
