From the D'Aguilar Highway: At Yarraman, turn left onto the New England Highway and follow for 75 kilometres to Crows Nest. The showground is the north side of town on the Left.

<u>Crows Nest In Brief</u> Crows Nest is a rural town located in the Toowoomba Region. It is located in the Darling Downs on the New England Highway, 158 kilometres from Brisbane and 43 kilometres from Toowoomba. In the 2016 census, Crows trails through the Nest had a population of 2160 people.

Perched on the crest of the Great Dividing Range, the old timber town of Crows Nest lies amongst pretty, undulating hills and is built around an attractive village green. In the centre of the green, known as Centenary Park, is the statue of Jimmy Crow, a local Aboriginal man, after whom some believe the town was named. Its streets are filled with striking old buildings that house antique shops, cafes, galleries and a museum. Centenary Park has won awards for its design, including its innovative underground water catchment.

This small town packs a lot of historical punch. Within an easy walk of the town centre, you'll find Salts Antiques, Carbethon Folk Museum, the Regional Art Gallery and a community arts and crafts centre. After hoofing it around town make for the Applegum Walk - a pleasant stroll along the creek between Bullocky's Rest and Warmann Park. The Crows Nest Show is a significant regional event held annu-

ally in May. Pack a picnic nearby Crows Nest Nationwhere you'll find bird ing and bushwalking eucalypt forest. After rains you'll see Crows Nest Falls in action. You may even brushspot a tailed rock wallaby perched on the





hat set of wheels sitting in the driveway is more than just a means of getting you from A to B. Fix a towbar to the back and it can open world of whole life-enhancing possibilities from caravanning dragging that boat or transporting that horse float you've always wanted. towing is a serious business, involving the laws of physics and potentially serious consequences. Here are a few things you need to keep in mind to do it right.

Use the Right Car

Not all cars are natural towing vehicles. Front-wheel drives are inherently disadvantaged because towing pushes a vehicle's weight distribution towards the rear, away from the wheels with the power. Rear-drive cars cope better with a wider breadth of scenarios – say, a heavy boat/trailer combination and greasy boat ramp – because the weight is over the driving wheels, leading to better traction. A four-wheel drive is even better.

Then there's your engine. A petrol engine isn't a reason not to tow but diesels typically produce their grunt lower in the rev range and are more economical when worked hard.


Know Your Numbers

First, you need to know the weight of whatever you're towing and your car's maximum towing capacity. However, in the real world, a safety margin should be applied: 20% is a common recommendation (that is, a 2000 kilogram maximum should really mean 1600kg).

Next, tow ball download (TBD), which is essentially the vertical force applied to the tow ball. This is typically about 10 per cent of the weight you're towing (that is, a 2000kg trailer will push 200kg onto the towball) and most cars' maximum TBD ratings are in proportion to their overall maximum towing capacity. Some cars, though, have even lower TBD ratings, so you need to check.

Carrying Complicates Things

If you're using your vehicle both to tow and carry heavy loads – a common scenario for ute owners – you need to know your maximum gross vehicle mass (GVM) and gross combination mass (GCM). The GVM is the maximum weight allowed for your



Always Do Pre-Flight Checks

Caravans, boat trailers and the like are often left idle for long periods, then the kilometres get stacked on in one big session. Unsurprisingly, this no-use/hard-use scenario can lead to mechanical trouble.

A pre-flight check is therefore a must before setting-off. This should include tyre pressure, brake, tail and indicator lights and, for caravans, disconnecting or fastening hot spots (power, gas bottles, water, waste water, etc).

Your towing vehicle will need to work harder than usual too, so a pre-trip service before any longer haul should be mandatory.

Apply a Soft, Steady Touch

Your car will feel very different and react differently when it's towing a load. It won't accelerate as easily, will take much longer to stop and require a wider line to avoid cutting tighter corners. Reversing manoeuvres will naturally require more skill and patience and, at high speeds, trailer sway could make it a potentially uncontrollable pendulum. If you're expecting to reverse regularly, do some practise before turning-up to a slippery boat ramp. When reversing, if you're not sure, get out and have a look or employ a wing-walker (wife of partner).

Safe towing is all about knowing your vehicle's limits, anticipating what's going-on around you, and applying a soft, steady touch. This won't just make for a smoother driving but less wear-and-tear for the towing vehicle. If you're a rookie, start with smaller and familiarise yourself progressing to more challenging drives. Don't be afraid to book into towing courses driver-training offered by some organisations. You can't be too safe.
