



The Park's offer continues until the 28th July 2020. We decided to stay an extra two days as did the Gowers and they only charged us the







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

The Great Caravan Debate ~ Fiberglass vs Aluminum

caravan owners since the 1960s; is fibreglass or aluminium a better option?

The question of whether your caravan should be made from aluminium or fibreglass dates back to the 1960s when fibreglass was first put to serious use by manufacturers such as Roadmaster and Spacemaster. Materials and manufacturing methods have taken great strides since then, but it's still useful to know how they differ in terms of strength, durability and other factors. Here's an overview.

Benefits of Fibreglass

<u>Moulding:</u> The ability to mould large sections is still perhaps the biggest advantage fibreglass has over aluminium. Fibreglass can be formed into a nose cone, rear or a complete van in aerodynamic shapes that are only limited by the designer's imagination.

Strength: Fibreglass's ability to wrap around corners can greatly strengthen the van and mounting points for lights, shaped tank inlets and window reveals can all be built into the mould. This eliminates the need for many of the fittings and heavy corner bracing found in aluminium models.

Impact resistance: A fibreglass caravan also has greater impact resistance. A small bump that will dent an aluminium van can leave fibreglass unscathed. Hail, for example, may pockmark an aluminium roof but

is likely to leave fibreglass undamaged. If minor damage occurs, the fibreglass can be repaired by boat builders or even a surfboard craftsperson.

<u>Maintaining the coat:</u> Some early fibreglass models suffered from 'crazing' of the gel coat, which can be expensive to repair but does not affect the strength or structural integrity of the van. Later models offer more resistance to UV light and reduced fading and discolouration. If you are restoring an older model, the finish may be improved with a good polish, but always use a polish recommended by the manufacturer rather than regular car polish.

Benefits of Aluminium

<u>Weight:</u> Even when the extra fittings and bracings are taken into account, an aluminium caravan can be lighter than a fibreglass equivalent. This can be critical if you have limited towing capacity or want to save fuel.

<u>Repairs:</u> Another key advantage of aluminium is ease of repairs. Fibreglass is more resistant to small bumps, but severe damage to a large panel may see an older fibreglass van written off due to the high cost of repairs or replacement. An aluminium van, on the other hand, may only require a replacement sheet.

In addition, panels for older fibreglass vans may no longer be available, whereas aluminium sheets are sold in all but the oldest textures.

<u>Hybrid models:</u> Both materials have their benefits and drawbacks, and a smart manufacturer who recognises this may build a van with an aerodynamic fibreglass nose cone, aluminium roof and walls, and a fibreglass rear section. Moulded fibreglass corners can provide added strength and prevent the van from shaking apart on rough roads.

And the winner is...

Fibreglass does offer exciting design possibilities, but the lighter weight and lower construction costs associated with aluminium make it likely that it will continue to be popular for many years to come.



CARAVAN DIESEL HEATER VS CARAVAN GAS HEATER

Baby it's cold outside, but that doesn't mean you should store your caravan until warmer weather. Get yourself a caravan heater and long may the adventures continue.

When buying your caravan heater, there's one important question to answer: diesel or gas? There's no right or wrong answer. As with all caravan appliances, it depends on a few important factors, including your set-up, how you like to travel and how cold it's going to get.

Let's look at how they compare:

Pros of Diesel Heaters:

Readily available fuel source. This is a pro if you already have a diesel vehicle. The heater gets the fuel it needs for heating directly from the vehicle's tank. This is an advantage since you can fill-up with diesel at every service station.

Super-efficient. Caravan diesel heaters have a very low rate of fuel consumption and are highly efficient form of heating.

Flexible installation. Unlike gas heaters, diesel units do not have a flue that goes through the wall but rather an exhaust that goes through the floor of the vehicle. This gives greater flexibility for installation, which can also be carried out DIY without the need for a qualified tradesperson.

Pre-warm the van. Use a diesel heater to pre-warm an RV interior while you're still driving. Perfect for when you arrive in the high country and the temperature has already dropped!

Clean dry heat. Caravan diesel heaters produce a clean dry heat, which means none of the humidity and condensation that you can get from gas heaters.

Cons of Diesel Heaters:

Requires a diesel fuel tank. For caravans this is a definite drawback of diesel heaters and means extra cost. That said, for diesel engine motorhomes, the fuel supply is already in place.

Can be more expensive than LG gas heaters. This depending on brand and country of manufacture. The upfront cost of a diesel caravan heater can bust the budget for some people. But it's worth remembering that they can be a more economical option for larger vans in the long term.

Louder than their gas counterparts. Noise can be minimised by selecting quality units and ensuring they are installed properly.

Pros of Gas Heaters:

Gas setup is already in place. Most caravans already have a gas cooker, water heater and maybe a three-way fridge, so the gas is already installed and ready to go. On the other hand, if you choose a diesel heater, you need a separate fuel tank.

Runs independently from the engine. The heater runs straight from a gas bottle to provide an economical heat source.

Very quiet to run. Only the fan creates any noise. For example, the Truma Vario Eco Gas Heater boasts near silent operation for the perfect night's sleep.

Cheaper than diesel. Gas heaters tend to be cheaper upfront, making them a good option for shorter trips.



Cons of Gas Heaters:

Regulatory requirements. A big downside to gas heaters are the regulations. They must be installed by a licensed gas fitter in accordance with gas regulations. For example, a gas heater flue cannot be installed too close to a window, door, other gas appliance inlet or outlet, under awning and so on. For some caravans, this rules-out a gas heater completely. However, it's worth bearing in mind that Truma, a top name in gas heaters, offers extremely compact gas heaters that can be installed in almost any position.

Increased demand on gas supply. Although they are becoming more energy efficient, the higher demand on your gas supply could become an issue if you're away from towns and have limited gas refill options.

Before You Buy:

When choosing between a gas heater and a diesel caravan heater, answer these questions:

- What temperatures will you experience on your trip?
- How big is your vehicle?
- What's the available space for installation?
- Do you already have a diesel fuel tank or gas installed?
- Will it be enough to run a heater too?
- What's your budget (including installation)?

Costs of Gas Heaters:

The cost of both diesel and gas heaters can vary. One can easily pay up to \$2,000 or more for a top-brand model, however, much cheaper brands may be found on eBay from as little as \$200 which are just as efficient. Club member, Bob Kearney, recently purchased one such brand (diesel) which he self-installed. He has documented the installation process which he intends to upload onto the QCC Facebook Group.
