NANANGO Nanango is situated 190 kilometres north-west of Brisbane and sits at the junction of the D'Aguilar and Burnett Highways.

The original inhabitants of the area were Aboriginals belonging to the Wakka Wakka (or Waka Waka) people. The area was used as a gateway to the bunya nut festivals, where Aboriginal people would travel from as far away as the Clarence River in northern New South Wales and the Maranoa River to feast on bunya nuts from the bunya trees.

The area around Nanango was first settled by Europeans in 1847. The first commercial establishment at the present site of Nanango was Goode's Inn, founded by prospector

Jacob Goode in July 1848. The inn served travellers journeying from Brisbane and Limestone (now Ipswich) and became the meeting place for early residents of Taromeo, Tarong and Nanango stations.

Nanango claims to be the fourth oldest town in Queensland. The name 'Nanango' evolved from the Wakka Wakka word 'Nunangi'. There is dispute over the origins of the name Nanango - the word

means 'large watering hole' or was also the name of a local Aboriginal elder at the time of settlement. The original settlement was called 'Noogoonida' by the Aboriginals, meaning 'place where the waters gather together'.

Beef, dairy and timber (in particular the valuable red cedar) were the primary early industries in the area. The discovery of gold at the Seven Mile Diggings near Nanango in 1867 precipitated a gold rush, and consequently a local population boom, however the gold deposits were found to be meagre. At one time the population included 700 miners, many of whom were Chinese.

A second population boom occurred when the Brisbane Valley railway line was extended to Yarraman in 1911. Nanango became the terminus of a branch-off the South Burnett railway line at Kingaroy on 13 November 1911. The 22.5 kilometres missing rail link between Nanango and Yarraman, although planned was never built.

After World War I, however, growth levelled-off until the early 1970s when the development of the Tarong Power Station led to a third population explosion. McCauley Weir was used as the town's water supply until three additional bores were drilled at the confluence of Barkers Creek and Meandu Creek.

Today, Nanango's principal industries are power generation, coal mining, agriculture, beef and pork production, dairying and milk processing, timber growing and milling, small crops, natural medicine, art and craftwork and tourism.

Also on the D'Aguilar Highway are the Tipperary Flat pioneering displays that paint a vivid picture of life as it used to be. You can also visit nearby Ringsfield House; a large, grand turn-of-the-century Queenslander designed by famed architect Robin Dods and faithfully restored and furnished to reflect its diverse history. Tour the house and stay for morning or afternoon tea or a tasty lunch on the veranda overlooking the gardens.

Get into the country spirit at the local horse races – Lee Park Racetrack hosts six meetings a year. For racing of a more hair-raising nature, the South Burnett Go-Kart track is also close by.

Other annual events where you can soak up the country vibe include the Nanango Show in April, Heritage Nanango Country Music Muster in September and Waterhole Rocks in October.

If you love a country market, Nanango has one of the biggest in South East Queensland. Held on the first Saturday of each month at the Nanango Showgrounds you'll find something for everyone.

In the 2016 census, Nanango had a population of 3,599 people.

Highly recommended is a visit to the South Burnett Visitor Information Centre, located at 41 Henry Street, Nanango. Closes at 4:00pm. You won't be disappointed.

## Member Profile ~ Life and Times of Sue and Jim Thorpe ....

In 1951, my parents moved from Melbourne where I was born in 1949 (yes, another 49er in the club) to the village of Buninyong (10 km south of Ballarat), and Sue's parents moved from Geelong (where Sue was born in 1950) to Ballarat. We blame these moves so early in our lives for creating our strong 'Gypsy' streak.

Sue and I met in 1968, and married in 1971. During our marriage we have lived in four states (two twice) and have moved house twenty times. Until we retired, all our moves were work-related. lt may surprise some people that we met at a dance in the Civic Hall in Ballarat. With time off to raise our three children, dancing has remained a passion for us both to this day.

Our children, Bernard, Jennifer and Steven between them, have presented us with eight grandchildren with ages ranging from six to twenty. Bernie lives in Brisbane, Jenni in San Francisco and Steve in Perth. Their distribution around the globe contributes to our regular interstate and overseas travel. We try and visit our remote families at least twice a year.

When Sue and I met, I was an apprentice bricklayer (with a burning ambition to be a technical school principal), and Sue had been accepted and was about to march into the Australian Army as a WRAAC. Consequently we courted through the medium of letters and telephone, and when possible getting together wherever we could.

I was fortunate in achieving my work ambition in 1987 when I was appointed Director, Central Highlands College of TAFE Emerald, Queensland. I had attended a technical college in Ballarat for my secondary education, a technical college in Melbourne for my apprenticeship training, and another technical college in Ballarat for building technician training at night. In 1973, I was appointed as a technical teacher at Eagle Farm Whinstanes College, Queensland. Subsequently, I worked there, followed by time at Bald Hills TAFE, South Brisbane TAFE, Technical Correspondence School, Toowoomba TAFE, North Point Institute and Mt Isa TAFE, prior to promotion to Director Emerald TAFE. From when I left Primary school, I spent my life either as a student, teacher or educational administrator at a Technical or TAFE College.



While working full time as a teacher and in more senior roles, I continued to study part-time eventually achieving a number of higher educational qualifications. I was aware that in order to be promoted further, both extensive experience and higher qualifications would be required. None of my achievements would have been possible without the full support and

encouragement of Sue.

Shortly after gaining the Director's position at Emerald, all such roles were made contract positions. I had to reapply and was reappointed under the new conditions to a five year contract which I served out. I had always imagined I would from retire TAFE Queensland at 65 years of age, but as a contract

employee, the nexus was broken, and in due course, I cast my eye wider. Subsequently, I served contracts in senior roles in Western Australia for the state government, in Victoria for the University of Ballarat, and New South Wales for the State government retiring as Institute Director, TAFE New South Wales Western Institute. All my senior roles were regionally-based. As an example, in my last job, I was based in Orange and had twenty four TAFE colleges from Lithgow to Broken Hill reporting.

Sue resigned from the army upon marriage. We built a new home on a hill in Ballarat East and started our family straight away. We decided that the best way to raise a family would be for Sue to be a full time mum. At this she was very successful raising three children through to university education, on to successful careers and subsequent marriage and family responsibilities. As well, Sue also fully supported me in my various work and other roles and in my endeavours for self improvement and advancement. Once our 'nest' emptied, Sue rejoined the outside workforce working in the Town Library (Port Hedland), and aged care (Orange).

While working full-time and studying part-time, I enjoyed fifteen years CMF/Army Reserve service. When I first volunteered after missingout on national service, Sue outranked me. Subsequently, I served in infantry units in Victoria and Queensland. I also spent a number of years in various postings in the Corp of Transport specialising in road transport (trucks) and movement control. For twelve of my fifteen years service, I was a commissioned officer. It was with great reluctance, I resigned from the Active Reserve, a part-time role, to focus more fully on family and my full time career.

Twelve months before we retired we upgraded our tent to a camper trailer. However, we found it very difficult to get away on weekends to use it while working. My office in Orange overlooked the main intersection in town, and I found myself watching caravans drive past wishing I was with them. Decision time! Time to retire. We did this in mid-2006 and returned to Queensland and Brisbane.

Not long after returning to Brisbane, we joined the South East Caravan Club to join like-minded people in our new recreational activity of caravanning. Over the next ten years, we attended many monthly rallies and several state rallies all of which we enjoyed. In 2018, we joined QCC, as by this time, we knew many of the club's friendly members and the clubs more flexible attendance requirements better met our needs. We have not been disappointed and have found everyone to be so welcoming and inclusive. Since retirement, we estimate we have travelled over 140,000 kilometres towing either our camper or our caravan around Australia. It has been a wonderful experience enjoying the 'freedom of the road'.

In addition to extensive travel throughout Australia during our retirement, we have been fortunate to have travelled the wider world regularly, clocking-up forty-three trips and visiting eighty-six countries to date. Cruising by ship has also been a big part of our overseas travel with over four hundred sea nights on thirty-six cruises with a number of different cruise lines. If not for COVID-19 restrictions, we would have added another sixty three nights to our tally.

Three years ago we moved into Living Gems Riverside in Caboolture South, a resort for active over 50's. Living here we are able to engage in all the interests we already had plus some new ones. These include lawn bowls, swimming, walking, cycling, kayaking, ten-pin bowls, tennis, and card and board games.

We both still maintain outside activities such as social ballroom dancing. I play lawn bowls socially at a local club and Sue enjoys her book club.

Caravanning through QCC is also an important outside activity we hope to maintain for many years to come.

#### IS YOUR CARAVAN'S COMPLIANCE PLATE LYING TO YOU? **RV**DAILY

The trailer plate, often misleadingly referred to as the compliance plate, is an important part of a caravan or camper-trailer, but is your compliance plate lying to you?

The intent of fastening trailer plate to a vehicle is to provide assurance from the manufacturer - to vehicle registration authorities and the purchaser - that the vehicle is fully compliant with all prescribed legislation and as such it is ready for use on Australian roads. Sadly, for far too many caravans, this is clearly not the case.

Vehicle Safety Standards has stated that all information provided on a trailer plate must be:

- Legible.
- True.
- Correct.
- Accurate.
- Complete.





Actual Masses such as Tare Mass and Empty Ball Loading must be physically measured, by scales or on a weighbridge that is certified and has been independently checked for accuracy, as prescribed in the licencing contract. The Tare Mass and Empty Ball Loading measurements must be made when the caravan (including water tanks and gas cylinders) is completely empty, and fitted with all equipment that is specified on the sales contract.

The legal significance of an assurance needs to be clearly understood. Negligence, ignorance and assumption are not defences for stating any information that is not in strict accordance with the requirements. Needless to say, stating any information that is fraudulent is a very grave matter.

The trailer plate must show at least the following information:

- Manufacturer's name.
- Caravan model.
- Vehicle Identification Number (17-digit). •
- Date of manufacture (month/year, e.g., 08/20).
- Aggregate Trailer Mass (ATM) rating. •

VIN

Certification Statement: 'This trailer was manufactured to comply with the Motor Vehicle Standards Act 1989'.

The trailer plate may also include additional information, such as that required for the tyre placard. Masses and Ratings must be stated in kilograms (kg). Tyre inflation pressures must be stated in kPa (not psi).

The full specifications of the wheels (diameter, width and profile) and tyres (diameter, section ratio, width, and type [P/C/LT]) must be stated so that there is no guessing required to determine the complete specifications.

In addition to the information that is required by VSB1 (Vehicle Standards Bulletin No.1), it is most prudent to advise additional information that may very well be deemed to be "information required by the owner/driver, so as to best ensure that the tow vehicle and caravan are loaded and used in a safe and legal manner".

This information includes the:

- Gross Trailer Mass (GTM) Rating.
- Axle-Group Rating.
- Empty Ball Loading.

The Gross Trailer Mass (GTM) Rating is needed to confirm what braking system is required... is it above or below 2000kg?

The Axle Group Rating and the Gross Trailer Mass (GTM) ratings are needed - for non-load-sharing suspension systems - to confirm if the 120% safety factor has been incorporated in the design of the suspension system.

The Empty Ball Loading is needed to ensure that the caravan is suitable for the intended tow-vehicle. It will also assist in correctly loading the caravan so that load-distribution (in a side view) does not cause any rating to be exceeded, or the caravan to develop hazardous handling and stability problems on the road.

It is recommended that the offset - plus or minus 'X' mm - of the wheels be added so that if aftermarket wheels are fitted, the same offset can be selected, so as to avoid having the tyre's sidewalls foul on any chassis or body component, which can readily cause dangerous blowouts.

It is important to know that the allocated GTM Rating has been properly determined by the manufacturer.





Unfortunately, many people continue to use the incorrect 'old husbands tale' or either of these two equations:

- Empty Ball Loading = ATM Rating GTM, or
- GTM Rating = ATM Rating Empty Ball Loading.

This is completely wrong because there is no logical relationship involved!

The ATM and GTM are fixed ratings allocated by the manufacturer, in relation to the maximum-permissible allup and Axle(s) limits.

The Empty Ball Loading is an actual mass that must be measured and is obviously applicable only to the empty (Tare Mass) condition.

The correct formula is, at any time:

• Actual Ball Loading = All-up Mass - Axle(s)-Loading.

It is essential that all caravan buyers fully understand all of the information that is provided by the manufacturer on the trailer plate, before they accept the caravan, in order to avoid possible major problems in the future. You should obtain a copy of the certified measurements of the Tare Mass and the Empty Ball Loading.

If you have any questions about any items on the trailer or compliance plate, it is important to have the dealer provide a concise and credible explanation. That way, if your compliance plate is lying to you, you have the opportunity to sort it out there and then. Not later. And not in court.

PET POLICY QUEENSLAND CARAVAN CLUB INC. *'Fellowship on Wheels'* 

Our Pet Policy ....

This Policy applies to all members, visitors, and guests whilst at a rally site and for the entire duration of the rally, i.e., upon arrival on site and until departure. This Policy is in conjunction with any other pet policy imposed by the venue at which our rally is being held.

It must be remembered that although many of us enjoy pets, not all club members are pet lovers. However, if we abide by a few simple rules, there is no reason why members and visitors cannot all be happy and have a harmonious rally relationship and environment. Please refer to QCC By-Law No. 19 for further details.

It is important to be aware that:


- Pet owners/carers are responsible for keeping their pets quiet at all times.
- Barking dogs may be disturbing to others, and therefore, shall not be tolerated.
- Pets must be restrained and kept within the confines of the owner/carer's caravan/motorhome annex.
- Pets (dogs and cats) are always to be kept on a short leash or other type of restraint.
- When walking a pet, it must be on a short leash or other type of restraint and be in the hands of a responsible adult.
- A pet must not be off its leash anywhere on the rally site. The only exception being if
  a specific area designated for this purpose is provided by the venue.

Pets are not permitted in the following areas:

- Where food is eaten, prepared and/or served.
- Toilet/shower facilities.
- The hall or meeting area.
- Happy hour. The only exception being where happy hour is held under a member's caravan awning and it is at the discretion of the caravan owner as to whether a pet is permitted.
- Pet owners/carers must clean-up any mess their pet makes.

If a member is attending a rally with a pet, the rally marshal is to be advised on arrival.
