

Samford- a short history

Samford is a hilly area, roughly 21 kilometres (13 mi) north west of Brisbane. Access to Samford from Brisbane is via Samford Road through the Samford State Forest and takes about 10 minutes from Ferny Grove.

Samford is located adjacent to the Samford State Forest section of Brisbane Forest Park. Brisbane Forest Park comprises more than 26,500 ha enclosing 16 separate recreation areas. The wide variety of habitat provides a sanctuary for a broad range of native wildlife. Samford Valley is known as the "Home of the Powerful Owl", as the area is known to be an important breeding area for the bird, Australia's largest owl. Parts of D'Aguilar Range, which includes nearby Camp Mountain, Mount Nebo, Mount Glorious and Mount Pleasant, give rise to the valley in which Samford lies.

Samford was occupied by the indigenous people who named it Kupidabin, an Aboriginal word from the Waka language, meaning 'place of possums'. They named D.L. Brown's land in Samford, Karandukamari. Samford was an important location for "kippa-ring" or initiation ceremony. Tribes from Ipswich, Cressbrook, Mount Brisbane and Brisbane would travel here to have their "kippas" (young men) initiated.

Samford's very first inhabitants were an aboriginal tribe which belonged to the Waka language group, whose territory also included the upper Brisbane River and the South Burnett. While there are no aboriginal tribes still living in Samford, their history remains by means of the Bora Ring at Wights Mountain, the burial site near Upper Camp Mountain Road and the records kept at the local historical museum.

Although Samford is closer to Brisbane than most acreage areas in the Moreton Bay Regional Council, the secluded valleys of the upper reaches of the South Pine River were not settled by Europeans until the mid-1850s. The first land auctions were held on 1 February 1855.

Samford Provisional School opened on 1 October 1872. In 1879 it became Samford State School.

In 1916 the Highlands Estate was advertised for private sale by Robinson & Jolly. A map of the estate indicates the land was five minutes from the Samford railway station on the Enoggera Terror's Creek Line (the Dayboro railway line), which was under construction at the time.

Buildings began to appear in Samford Village's Main Street in 1916. The first business to open in the Samford area was a shop and bakehouse which was owned and built by Alex Lawson.

The **Samford railway station** on the Dayboro line opened 1 July 1918; it reached its terminus at Dayboro railway station on 25 September 1920.

In 1919, the O'Hara's Hotel (the Samford Hotel) shifted to its current location. The location from which the hotel previously operated was purchased and used by the CSIRO. In the late 1950s, this hotel again changed its name from the Samford Railway Hotel to the Golden Valley Hotel.

By 1908, banana growing on the steep ridges at the foot of the ranges had become one of the most important industries in the Samford district. After World War 1, the government created additional small farms so that returned servicemen with limited capital were able to get started in the industry. During 1926 and 1927, more bananas were consigned to southern markets from Samford Railway Station than any other railway station in Queensland. However this success was short-lived. The banana bunchy top virus which had wiped out banana growing in the Northern Rivers region of New South Wales, spread to Samford and was the primary reason for the decline of the industry in the Pine Rivers Shire.

After the subdivision of farms into acreage homesites commenced in the 1960s, with substantial upgrading of road access completed more recently, many of Samford's residents commute to work in Brisbane.

In 2008, Samford became part of the Moreton Bay Region.


Club Apparel

Warning for Potential-Buyers of New Caravans

Potential buyers of caravans need to be extremely careful to ensure that their proposed caravan is in fact fully-compliant with Australia's vehicle safety Regulations, as stated in the national **Australian Design Rules**.

The Federal government's **Vehicle Safety Standards** branch has recognised the problems in the caravan industry, and is introducing a new **Road Vehicle Standards Act** in July this year. This replaces the **Motor Vehicle Standards Act**, which has been in force since 1989.

Caravan industry veterans have warned potential buyers to be well aware that there are currently *many non-compliant* caravans on our roads, and that the new regulations will *not* guarantee that *all* future caravans will be fully-compliant.

The new safety and quality regulations will **not** apply to **all** manufacturers and importers. This is of **serious concern** as **some** companies - that produce caravans in **small** numbers - will be **exempt** from having to meet the requirements of the new laws. These companies that will **not** be subject to the same level of government scrutiny of the new laws, are usually **new-comers** to the market, and often **lack** the necessary **resources** and **experience** that are **essential** to manufacture **safe** and **high-quality** caravans. They also lack the expected professional after-sales service and repair facilities across the country.

Industry insiders have long been worried that there are *too* many *new* manufacturers and importers competing in a very *limited*, and *highly-competitive*, market.

Vehicle Safety Standards will allow larger caravan companies a lengthy "phase-in" period to "get up to speed" with the new requirements, so it may well be that the *intended* benefits of the new laws will **not** become apparent for up to one year after their introduction.

Unfortunately for the many owners of defective *non-compliant* caravans, there are **no** retrospective provisions in the new *Act*, hence they are being forced to continue to pursue rectification action against the Dealers who sold them their vehicles. Despite the good *intentions* of the *Australian Consumer Law* to protect customers who bought *unsatisfactory* – or even *unsafe* – products, it is well known that getting the Dealers to honour their responsibilities, is often *very* difficult.

With "Self-Certification" permitted – combined with the lack of acceptable Regulatory auditing of businesses, and auditing of vehicles – it is not possible for prospective buyers to have sufficient confidence in the Design / Manufacturing / Compliance / Safety / Quality of all new caravans.

It is *vital* that potential-buyers "do their home-work" *thoroughly*, before deciding on a particular Make and Model - rather than being "*persuaded*" by a sales-person to buy a "better" (higher priced) caravan, which may, or may **not**, live up to the promises made.

They *must* decide beforehand, *precisely* what *type* of caravan they really *need* that will suit their *intended* travel *plans*, and what they can *afford*.

There are free detailed independent Check-Lists available for potential-buyers of caravans, where:

- (a) An *Evaluation* can be determined of what they need / want / prefer in a new 'van, and
- (b) A Comparison can be made of what Makes and Models come the closest to matching the required and preferred criteria.

This will be a *major* investment, and as such, the purchase *must* be made on a *practical* basis... and *not* on an *emotional* basis.

Sales-personnel are professionally trained to **sell**. Caravan buyers are **not** trained to **buy**, and as a result, they will very often suffer severe *disappointment* and *distress*, when they realise that what they have purchased is **not** up to their expectations.

Sadly, there are currently too many serious **Non-compliance**, **Safety** and **Quality** problems... with subsequent **complaints** and **litigation**.

When someone buys a new *car* or *truck*, there is *no* need for them to know all about the *Australian Design Rules* (ADR's) and other *regulatory* requirements, because *Vehicle Safety Standards* (VSS) would have *approved* the Manufacturer's *Compliance* submission and *Quality* program.

However, because of the permitted "Self-Certification", caravan buyers are not afforded any where near the same degree of assurance.

Obviously, caravan buyers are certainly *not* expected to be experts on all applicable *Regulatory* requirements, hence a *very* high level of *confidence* in the Manufacturer and Dealer is required.

There are freely-available "Buyer-Assist" Check-Lists that include important Questions that potential-buyers need to ask the Dealer. It is most prudent to obtain the answers in writing.

All too often, caravanners who have purchased a new 'van, some time later conduct a fine-tooth inspection of their new pride-and -joy, and pedantically note every *minor* blemish. These annoying imperfections should *clearly* have been detected during the **Pre** -**Delivery Inspection** and advised to the Dealer.

Grey Nomads urged to help Roadhouse solve Staff dilemma

THE owner of a remote and well known Queensland roadhouse has appealed to grey nomads to help her out of a staffing predicament. Cheri Stanger said The Burke and Wills


Roadhouse – halfway between Cloncurry and the Gulf of Carpentaria, a distance of nearly 400km – is being run on a skeleton staff due to the shortage of backpackers. "We are facing an unpredicted, unprecedented and undeniable challenge after COVID," she wrote on the roadhouse's Facebook page. "We are getting busier and busier each day, which is exactly what we've been working so hard to achieve, but we cannot find employees to share the workload with." She said a friend who owned another well known Australian roadhouse had posted over 1200 messages/posts looking for people but with no success. "Maybe some grey nomads want to help out for a few weeks at a time," she said. "If the grey nomad population worked their way around Australia and stopped at all these rural pubs and roadhouses they'd be helping these rural businesses back on their feet. We have a lot of truckies and travellers that rely on us being open. We need help."



This Policy applies to all members, visitors and quests whilst at a rally site for the entire duration of the rally, i.e., upon arrival on site and until departure. This Policy runs in conjunction with any other pet policy imposed by the venue at which our rally is being

It must be remembered that although many of us enjoy pets, not all club members are pet lovers. However, if we abide by a few simple rules, there is no reason why we cannot all be happy and have a harmonious rally environment. Refer to the By-Law No. 19 for further details.

It is important to be aware that:

- Pet owners/carers are responsible for keeping their pets quiet at all times.
- Barking dogs will not be tolerated as this can be disturbing to others.
- Pets must be restrained and kept within the confines of the owner/carer's caravan/annex.
- Pets are to be kept on a short leash or other type of restraint at all times.
- When walking a pet, it must be on a short leash or other type of restraint and be in the hands of a responsible adult.
- A pet must not be off its leash anywhere on the rally site. The only exception being if a specific area designated for this purpose is provided by the venue

Pets are not permitted in the following areas:

- Where food is eaten, being prepared and/or served.
- Toilet/shower facilities.
- The hall or meeting area
- Happy hour. The only exception being where happy hour is being held under a member's caravan awning and it is at the discretion of the cara to whether a pet is permitted.
- Pet owners/carers must clean-up any mess their pet makes.

If a member is attending a rally with a pet, the rally marshal is to be advised on arrival.


